As the sun settles in the west birds roost in their nests; so a crosshatched bird's nest provided the cradle for "west", and nest became west. Man's fertile imagination conceived a new ideograph — a nest with a brooding bird, hatching up a new form which finally developed into a full-fledged character for west. As all "thing" exist between east and west, the combination east-west, meaning "things, came to be applied to anything from east to west.

# The National Day of China

The National Day of China (simplified Chinese: 国庆节; traditional Chinese: 國慶節; pinyin: *guóqìng jié*) is celebrated every year on October 1.

It is a public holiday in the People's Republic of China to celebrate their national day.



## Culture Express



The PRC was founded on October 1, 1949 with a ceremony at Tiananmen Square. The Central People's Government passed the *Resolution on the National Day of the People's Republic of China* on December 2, 1949 and declared that October 1 is the National Day.

The National Day is celebrated throughout mainland China, Hong Kong, and Macau with a variety of government-organised festivities, including fireworks and concerts. Public places, such as Tiananmen Square in Beijing, are decorated with a festive theme as shown in the photo below.
